



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What Can Happen in 5-Years?

Phase One of Full Lives is the start to a 5-Year initiative





Objectives of Phase One

Foster collaborations among stakeholders in the regional food system.

Promote sustainable solutions for addressing food justice issues.

Empower communities to address systemic challenges within the food system. Enhance the capacity of collaboratives to implement projects effectively.



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The First Phase of Full Lives

RFP Phase One: July 2024 – December 2025



\$1.2 Million in Grants

\$250,000 - \$400,000 per Collaboration We anticipate funding 3 Collaborations

\$150K in Technical Assistance

To Support Cohort and Collaborative's Self-Identified Needs



Collaborations – Stronger Together

The community food system is complex, with multiple interconnected challenges within the system

We believe collaborations are better equipped than individual organizations because they can:

Address multiple interconnected challenges or goals within the community food system.

Embrace a holistic strategy that acknowledges various contributing factors.

Invest in initiatives covering a broad spectrum for a resilient and sustainable food system.



Core Grant Activities









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Application - Two Parts



Part 1 - Written Application

6 Questions Aligned with the Scoring Rubric.



Part 2 – Interview

Top-scoring collaborations will be invited to participate in a virtual conversation to talk more about their work and learn more about the Full Lives initiative. Aligned with the Scoring Rubric.



Funding Eligibility and Lead Organization Role

- The Lead Organization must be a 501c3 nonprofit organization or have a fiscal sponsor who is a 501c3.
- Your collaboration must designate one organization as the "Lead Organization" responsible for administering the grant funding to partner organizations. The Lead Organization's budget for the current fiscal year must be \$250,000 or higher.
- Collaboratives must operate within the Greater Twin Cities United Way nine-county service region (Anoka, Carver, Chisago, Dakota, Hennepin, Isanti, Ramsey, Scott, Washington).
- Collaboratives must target high food insecurity areas within our nine-county service region.
- Eligible collaborations should involve a mix of organizations ensuring diversity and expertise across the partnership.
 Eligible entities for collaboration include nonprofit organizations, community-based groups, governmental agencies, academic institutions, and other stakeholders actively engaged in addressing food justice and community food system issues.
- Collaboratives must involve partnerships with a minimum of three organizations, one of which is the lead entity responsible for administering grant funding.
- The Lead Organization within a collaborative partnership assumes key responsibilities, including grant administration, project management, stakeholder communication, budget management, learning and evaluation, and risk management.
- NOTE: Lead Organization is only eligible to receive a maximum grant size of up to 20% of their overall organizational budget.

Outcome Measurements

Required Outcomes

- Pounds of food produced
- Number of households or Individuals supported

Collaborative-Determined Outcome Measures

- Funded collaboratives will be asked to select at least two additional outcome measures that align with the work they are doing around community food systems.
- Select from a menu or provide us with their own measures.




Grant Terms and Payment Distribution

- Grants are anticipated to be between \$250,000 \$400,000; grant term is between July 2024 December 2025.
- Grant award will be made in 3 installments upon signature of the grant agreement; 85% of the grant award will be paid out in the first two installments.
- Mid-grant reflection meeting with full collaborative
- Bi-monthly learning conversations with the Full Lives Program Officer.
- Participation in Community of Practice—cadence and dates to be determined collectively.
- Final reporting at the end of the grant period.
